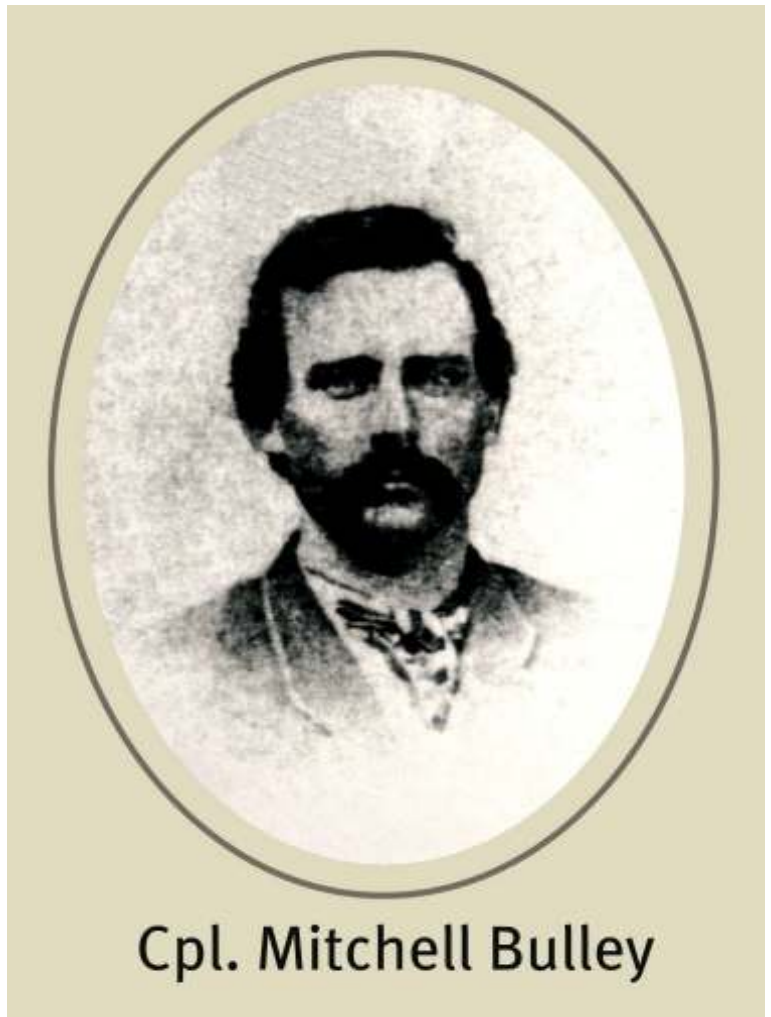


Mitchell Bulley (Boulé) died Thursday, August 16, 1900, at about one o'clock in the morning at his home at 78 Oak Street. Mr. Bulley was a veteran of two years in the Civil War, and had been wounded at Salem Church, VA. He was in charge of the lighthouses on the Plattsburgh breakwater for many years. Mr. Bulley had been in ill health for some time, and death was the result of a steady decline. He was 62 years old. Mr. and Mrs. Bulley had a family of nine children, some of whom moved to Pennsylvania. Their daughter, Lucille, married an Englishman, Walter Thompson in 1890. He died in 1894



and she and their two sons, Walter and Maurice, returned to her parents in Plattsburgh.
