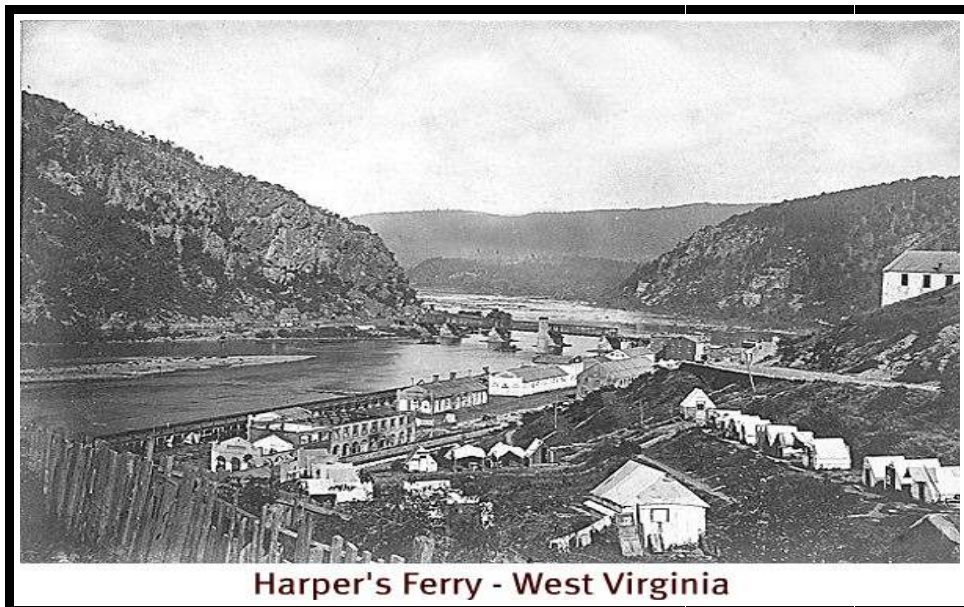


Charles Henry Good, aged 83, a veteran of the Civil War and one of the most highly respected citizens of this city died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. **J. B. (Ida) Hall**, 6 Macdonough Street, Saturday morning following a lingering illness.

Mr. Good was born in Plattsburg in August 6, 1843, and at the age of 20 enlisted in the 1st New York Engineers for a period of three years during the Civil War. While the terrible strife was on between the north and south he saw action in the Potomac River, campaign at Richmond, Fredericksburg and Petersburg. He also was stationed in the entrenchments in front of Petersburg and at Harper's Ferry. At the close of the war he was discharged at Philadelphia in 1865 and returned to Plattsburgh where he took up his residence.

On April 11, 1869, at Plattsburgh, he married **Mary Elizabeth Carroll**. Four children were born and those who survive him are **Walter A. Good**, of Roseberg, OR, Mrs. **J. B. Hall** of this city, and Mrs. **H. E. Marceau** of Bayonne, NJ. The late Mrs. **Charles D. Corbett** of Whitehall, NY, was a daughter.

In the death of Mr. Good Plattsburgh has lost one of its truest and most patriotic

citizens. He numbered his friends' by the hundreds and often times the younger folks would gather around him and listen to him, tell the conditions of the country fifty and sixty years ago. He was well posted on the news of the day and always took an active interest in the welfare of his community.

He was an active member of the G.A.R. organization of this city. His funeral was held from St. Johns Church, Tuesday morning at nine o'clock. Interment in Mount Carmel cemetery. A requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev. Father **Albert Farrell**, assistant pastor.

The esteem in which Mr. Good was held was shown by his large circle of acquaintances and large number of relatives and friends who assisted at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and offered up their prayers for the repose of his soul.

The draped casket which was tenderly borne to its last resting place in the old Catholic cemetery by **James Harney, Thomas Harney, Harold Delaney, A.W. Baker, John Finnegan** and **Frank Bird**. A firing squad from the 26th Infantry discharged a volley of shots in the air while the casket was being lowered into mother earth and a trumpeter blew taps.
