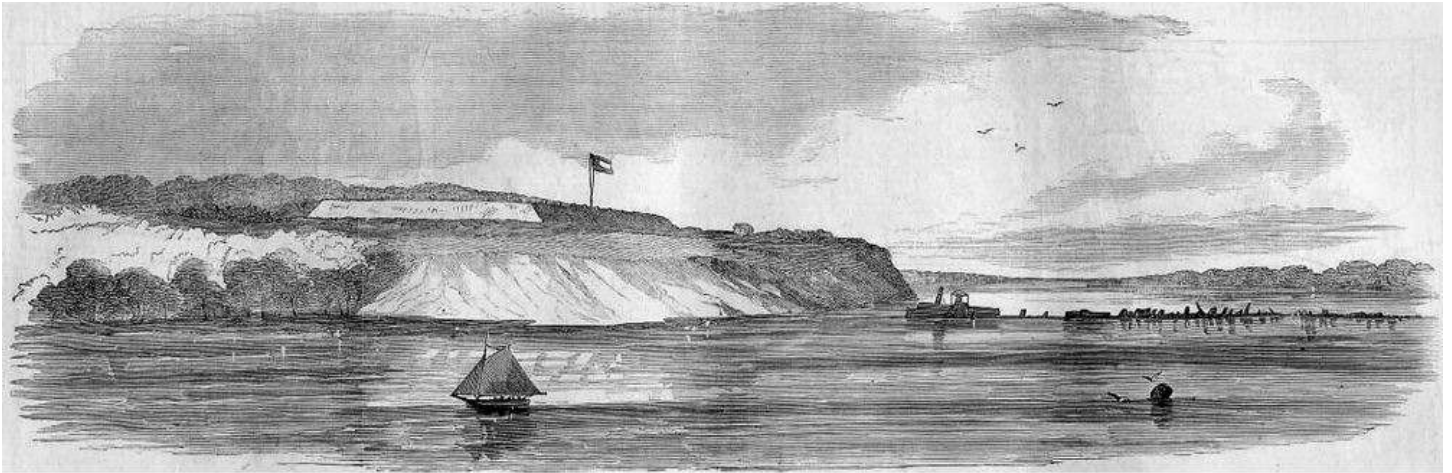


On August 11, 1862, twenty-seven year-old **Samuel Sherman** enlisted as a private at Horicon, NY. He rose through the ranks finally becoming a first lieutenant for Co. K of the 118th NY Volunteers on March 12, 1864. He was wounded and captured at Drury's Bluff, VA; paroled and discharged for wounds on October, 19, 1864.

The death of Comrade Samuel Sherman on Monday morning, August 19, 1895, in Saranac after a short sickness from cholera morbus and heart failure, came unexpected, and gave this community a shock. His funeral was held on the 21st, at the M. E. church according to the Masonic ritual. Rev. Cheeseman of Dannemora preached the funeral sermon. The house was filled with the friends and relatives.

Both Samuel and his wife, the former **Mary Jane Nay**, who her married on December 31, 1862, are buried in Saranac Independence Cemetery with several of their children; **Phanattie** (1863-1924), **Ira Allen** (1869-1912), **Lucy Ann** (1874-1930), **Willie A.** (1876-1899) and **Mary Jane** (1878-1952).

Shortly after his death, in November 29th, his daughter, **Jennie**, married **F. Ernest Bedell** of Saranac and so life went on.
